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Overview of the Booklet

This booklet is a practical guide for TESOL trainees, ESL teachers, language centers, and students. It provides clear and useful expressions organized into five key themes: General Classroom Instructions, Online and Hybrid Classes, Classroom Management, Teaching Language Skills and Concepts, and Building a Positive Learning Environment. At the end of each theme, a realistic scenario demonstrates how the expressions can be applied in actual teaching situations. New teachers can build confidence in giving clear instructions, while experienced teachers can refine their communication skills. For students, it helps make classroom language easier to understand, ensuring smoother and less stressful lessons.

This resource is designed primarily for pre-intermediate to upper-intermediate levels, with expressions tailored to these learners. Instructors working with advanced students may need to adjust the complexity of the expressions to suit their proficiency. Simple, effective, and practical, this booklet is ideal for creating engaging and organized ESL classes.

How to Study This Booklet

Before reading the expressions, think about your previous classes and try to guess what phrases teachers often use for instructions, managing activities, or handling challenges. Then, read through the list of expressions under each theme carefully. Afterward, explore the scenario at the end of each theme to see how the expressions are used naturally in a real classroom context. Each scenario also has an accompanying audio file, so you can listen to how the expressions sound in practice. Finally, practice using a few expressions in your own teaching or learning situations and reflect on how they can make lessons smoother and more engaging.



Theme 1 General Classroom Instructions



These expressions help teachers give clear directions and keep lessons organized. They guide students through activities, manage time, and encourage participation. Using simple and consistent instructions helps reduce confusion and keeps the class focused, making learning smoother and more effective.

Scenario Listen





It's a sunny morning in Vancouver, and Ms. Taylor's ESL class is buzzing with energy. Today's lesson is on "Tourism in Canada," a topic perfect for her diverse group of students who recently arrived in the country. With smiles on their faces, the students settle into their seats as Ms. Taylor greets them.

"Good morning, everyone! Let's get started. Please repeat after me: "The students echo the word, some stumbling slightly over the pronunciation but smiling as they correct themselves.

"Turn to page 22 in your textbook," she continues, pointing to a beautiful spread of Canada's most famous landmarks. The class flips their pages quickly, eyes widening as they see images of Niagara Falls, the CN Tower, and Banff National Park. "Raise your hand if you recognize any of these places." Hands shoot up across the room, with a few excited voices calling out, "Niagara Falls!" and "Banff!" Ms. Taylor nods encouragingly and writes the names of the landmarks on the board.

"Let's brainstorm some ideas. What are some tourist activities people enjoy in Canada?" Ms. Taylor asks, holding up her marker. After a short silence, students begin calling out, "Hiking!" "Sightseeing!" "Taking photos!" With each answer, she writes the word on the board, creating a list for the class to see.

"Write this down in your notebooks: 'Popular Tourist Attractions in Canada." The scratch of pencils fills the room as students carefully copy the heading into their notebooks. "Let's review yesterday's lesson quickly. Who remembers what



we learned about Canadian geography?" A hand goes up. "The provinces and territories," says one student. "Exactly!" Ms. Taylor responds with a smile.

To keep the momentum going, she announces, "Work in pairs and discuss: What tourist places would you recommend to a friend visiting Canada?" The students turn to their partners, chatting excitedly as they share ideas. Ms. Taylor walks around, listening to their conversations and gently correcting mistakes when needed.

Once the discussions settle down, she says, "Read the instructions carefully for the next activity." She points to Exercise 3 in their books, where students must match tourist activities with their descriptions. "You have 5 minutes to complete this task." She sets a small timer on her desk, and the students get to work, focused and determined.

When the timer buzzes, Ms. Taylor claps her hands gently. "Let's move on to the next activity." She explains that they'll now take turns sharing their recommendations with the class. "Who wants to share their answer first?" A shy student raises her hand and says, "Niagara Falls because it's very beautiful." The class nods in agreement, and Ms. Taylor praises her: "Well done!"

After a few more students share, Ms. Taylor wraps up the class. "Let's summarize what we learned today. What are some of Canada's popular tourist attractions?" Students call out their answers: "The CN Tower!" "Banff!" "Whistler!"

"Excellent work, everyone," Ms. Taylor says warmly. "Time's up! Let's stop here." The students smile and gather their books, clearly proud of their efforts. As they leave, she reminds them, "See you next class—don't forget to think of your favorite tourist destination for tomorrow's activity!"



Theme 2

Expressions for Online and Hybrid Classes



Teaching ESL online or in hybrid settings requires clear communication and effective use of technology to engage students. These expressions help teachers manage virtual classrooms, encourage participation, and maintain a smooth flow of activities. Scenario DListen



Ms. Taylor logs into her virtual ESL class right on time. The lesson today is about "Canadian Festivals" for her intermediate-level students who are learning from different parts of the country. She starts the class with a friendly smile. "Good morning, everyone! Make sure your camera is turned on." The students' screens light up with cheerful faces, and Ms. Taylor waves back. "Can you hear me clearly?" she asks, ensuring no technical issues are stopping anyone from following the class.

"I'll share my screen now to show you some pictures of famous Canadian festivals," she continues, pulling up a vibrant PowerPoint slide of the Calgary Stampede and the Montreal Jazz Festival. "Type your answers in the chat box: Have you ever been to a festival in Canada? Which one?" The students eagerly type responses, and Ms. Taylor reads a few out loud: "Oh, Alex went to the Vancouver Cherry Blossom Festival—that's a great one!"

After a few minutes of discussion, Ms. Taylor says, "Let's take a quick poll. I'll ask a question, and you can choose your answer. Which festival looks the most exciting to you?" Using a polling tool, students vote, and the results appear on screen.

"Great choices! Now, you have 10 minutes in your breakout rooms. Discuss this question with your group: 'What makes a festival fun for visitors?'" With a click, Ms. Taylor sends students to breakout rooms. She monitors the groups, joining each room briefly to check progress.

When the breakout time ends, she brings everyone back. "Let's watch this video together about the Calgary Stampede—it's Canada's largest outdoor



festival!" She shares her screen again, playing the short video clip. Students watch attentively, scribbling notes. "Can you write that on the virtual whiteboard? Let's list three key things that make a festival successful." One student writes "music," another adds "food," and a third suggests "cultural performances." "Well done!" Ms. Taylor praises them.

As the class wraps up, she reminds them, "Please upload your homework to the LMS by Friday. Don't forget to log in on time for our next session. We'll meet at the same link tomorrow."

"Before we go, thanks for joining today's session! You all did great work." Smiling, she waves goodbye as students log out, feeling accomplished after another successful online lesson.



Theme 3 Classroom Management



Classroom management expressions help teachers maintain order, encourage respectful behavior, and create a positive learning environment. These phrases ensure that lessons stay on track, students remain focused, and disruptions are minimized. By using clear, calm, and consistent language, teachers can address challenges effectively while keeping the classroom atmosphere supportive and productive.

Scenario DListen



It's a busy afternoon in Ms. Taylor's ESL classroom. Today, students are working on group presentations about "Famous People from Around the World." The groups are buzzing with energy, but Ms. Taylor knows she must balance enthusiasm with focus to ensure the lesson runs smoothly.

As the noise level rises, Ms. Taylor claps her hands softly to regain attention. "Let's quiet down, please." The chatter fades, and the students look up at her. "Eyes on me, please. We need to stay focused so everyone can do their best work."

One student, distractedly checking his phone, catches her eye. "Keep your phones away, please. You'll need to use that time to finish your slides," she says calmly but firmly. He nods, tucking his phone into his bag. Ms. Taylor turns to the entire class. "Follow the classroom rules: work respectfully with your group, and wait for your turn to speak." She walks around the room, pausing to check on a group where two students are speaking over each other. "Inside voices, please. Everyone will get a chance to share their ideas."

At another table, two students seem off-task. "Let's stay on task. What part of the presentation are you working on now?" she asks with a smile, redirecting their focus. One student explains, and she nods encouragingly.

Seeing a few groups getting restless, she calls out, "Settle down before we begin the next step. I'll give you 10 more minutes to finish." She notices a pair of students arguing softly and steps in: "Respect each other's opinions. Everyone's ideas are valuable, so let's listen and work together."



When the time is up, Ms. Taylor says, "Stop and listen carefully. Here's what we'll do next: Each group will line up and take turns presenting." She gestures to the front of the room. "Let's line up for the next activity. Remember to support your group members and speak confidently."

Finally, after all groups have presented, Ms. Taylor wraps up with a reassuring tone. "Take a deep breath and relax. You all did a fantastic job today." Smiles spread across the room as the students give each other quiet applause. "Finish your work quietly, and make sure your notes are ready for tomorrow's feedback session," she adds as students gather their materials and begin to leave.



Theme 4 Teaching Language Skills & Concepts

Mr. Chen is teaching a group of advanced ESL learners in Toronto. Today's lesson focuses on "Developing Listening Skills" using famous speeches as examples. The students are eager to practice understanding key ideas and details.

"Good afternoon, everyone," Mr. Chen begins as the class settles down.

"Let's practice pronunciation first. Repeat after me: 'inspiration,' 'leadership,' and 'perseverance.'" The students repeat the words, focusing on the sounds and rhythm.

Next, Mr. Chen cues up an audio clip. "Listen for the main idea of this speech by Martin Luther King Jr. What is the speaker trying to tell us?" The students listen intently as the clip plays, jotting down notes.

When the recording ends, Mr. Chen says, "Can you summarize this paragraph? Think of one sentence that explains the overall message of the speech." A few students share their ideas, and he nods approvingly.

"Highlight the key details in this transcript. Focus on the sentences that show the speaker's emotions and goals." The students use highlighters to mark parts of the text as Mr. Chen circulates to assist them.

"Now, underline the verbs in this sentence," he instructs, pointing to a line on the screen: 'I have a dream that one day....' Students quickly underline have and dream. "Good job!" Mr. Chen encourages them.



To build on the lesson, he says, "Let's brainstorm ideas for your essay. If you were to write about an inspirational leader, who would you choose and why?" Students call out names like Nelson Mandela and Malala Yousafzai.

To change things up, he announces, "Pair up for a role-play activity. One of you will play the role of the speaker delivering the speech, and the other will ask questions about its meaning." The students laugh and eagerly start practicing, mimicking intonation and emotion.

Finally, as the class winds down, Mr. Chen reminds them, "Write down the main points from the video for homework. We'll review them in tomorrow's class." He smiles as students finish their notes and pack their bags, excited to learn more about famous speeches.
